



Monthly Culture Checklist

- ☐ For Catasetinea growers, your plants should be in full growth mode. Keeping them wet and feeding them regularly will help their new growths mature. As the plants run through the heart of the growing season be sure to keep their roots safe (no more repotting until next year).
- High humidity and warm temperatures crate ideal conditions for bacterial and fungal infections. Keep a close eye on your plants to ensure you are able to catch these before they spread.
- □ Keep a close eye on plants for pest populations. Many insects are in enjoying the growing conditions that your plants are and pests that produce multiple generations a season will be well into their 2nd or 3rd. If you miss them now, they will quickly become a real threat to your collection.

Culture Column: Australian Dendrobium

Australian Dendrobiums are slowly gaining popularity in the U.S. Native to Australia (as their name implies), these plants look a little different from their non-Australian cousins. You can tell if your plants are Aussie Dendrobiums by their distinctive starburst-shaped blooms. They tolerate cooler temperatures than their Asiatic cousins and can produce multiple bloom cycles off a single bulb.

Light:

Bright light is best for these plants. In our area, growing them outdoors during the summer is a great solution where they are receiving extended hours of bright light throughout the day. The leaves should be a light green when they are receiving their optimum light requirements.

Potting Media:

Mature plants appreciate a chunky potting mix. Large to medium bark mixed with course stone works well. Avoid a mix that is prone to retaining moisture, especially during the winter months. Some literature suggests that growing these plants wet will encourage the production of keikis instead of blooms. These plants also can be grown on mounts if provided enough water and humidity.

Water:

Aussie Dendrobiums need a good supply of water during warmer growing periods. While the actual frequency is driven by your individual growing conditions, multiple waterings per week (in some cases as much as every other day) are recommended, slowly tapering down the frequency as temperatures start to cool and plants move towards their rest period. When plants as beginning to set buds, avoid getting water on the developing flowers, and be sure to water at the base of the plant to avoid damaging them.

Fertilizer:

These plants need consistent access to nutrients during their growing season. Fertilize weekly with a diluted low-nitrogen fertilizer (some literature suggests that higher-nitrogen fertilizer mixes encourage keikis instead of blooms) and match your fertilization schedule to your watering schedule, decreasing the frequency of fertilization as the season begins to change and your plants begin their winter rest.

Reblooming:

Most of the Aussie Dendrobium need a winter rest to keep them healthy and blooming. Reduce the frequency of watering and temperatures in the winter months.


