

plants outside. I find they really perk up when exposed to natural sunlight (not too much or too fast!), rain, and fresh air, hopefully to reward me with some nice blooms later in the year.


Laeliocattleya canhamiana coerulea 'Azure Skies' and Amitostiama enomotoe Grown by Linus Chen

The Laeliocattleya is grown semihydro (see page 7 for more information on the culture workshop Linus will be hosting in July on this technique). Linus is growing the Amitostigma in a shallow tub with other bog plants in a mix of kanuma and akadama, bringing the whole planting into an unheated garage any time the temps are below 20.

#### Grown by: David Meadows

I grow mostly Phrags. under fluorescent lights in a basement room. I grow them semi-hyro. using LECA as growing media. I hand water twice a week and have fans for circulation and a large humidifier for adding humidity. I usually purchase flasks and grow the plants to blooming stage. I usually keep plants for a second blooming but sell some at orchid events to make room. Phraa. kovachii is my passion but I have yet to bloom one. I've bloomed many of the kovahii hybrids with Peruflora Spirit beina the first. My favorite vendors are Chuck Acker Orchids and Woodstream Orchids. My mentor, Susan Kulhavi has helped me become a 'good' orchid grower with her vast knowledge of orchids.

#### Monthly Culture Checklist

- ☐ With light intensity starting to increase, check your plants for signs that they are receiving light that is too intense. Reddening, yellowing, or wilting leaves are signs that your plant many be getting too much sun. If you see these signs, you may need shade cloth or to move them to an area where the sun is less intense (dappled shade, etc.).
- ☐ Time to fertilize. With increases in growth, your plants will be hungry and can use the increase in nutrients to pack on strong healthy growths that will carry them through the winter and produce blooms.
- ☐ Though it hasn't felt like it recently, summer heat is on its way, be sure to keep up regular watering and, as heat and dryness set in later in the month, check your plants for increased water needs.
- Stay focused on air movement, especially if growing in a contained space. Increases in heat and humidity without good circulation can lead to an increase in diseases on your plants.

#### <u>Culture Column: Taming Unruly Bulbophyllums</u> Sarah Hurdel

Bulbophyllum blumei is still resisting my attempts to keep it in a pot. This is how I grow rambling Bulbophyllums.



I am pretty stubborn though, too - the pile of pins were used several months ago to turn the new growths back into the pot. I thought I had done a good job, but it just carried on and made new growths heading straight for the edge of the pot. One thing I forgot to do - is turn the new growths away from the light, sometimes

they will change direction on their own. Bulbo Reverse Psychology - let them think it is their idea to stay in the pot.

I used to grow a similar species which had even longer rhizomes between each growth, Bulbophyllum masdevalliaceum. That was impossible, and I had to give in and find a new home for it.



There is a short window of time to pin them down, before the new growths put out roots, but after the rhizome hardens up a

little bit. You can wait, but this seems to be the best time to pin them down without snapping them

off. Still, I always break at least one. This only seems to only encourage the plant to grow more. If I turn my back, I'm afraid I might find it rooted to the wall next time I look.



Not sure who will ultimately win this battle, but smart money is on the plant. Maybe we could agree on a truce if I gave it a larger bowl, but that would be a sign of weakness...


