Details on the September 20th Member Meeting.

September Speaker: Arthur Chadwick, Large-Flowered Cattleyas



Art holds a BS in Electrical Engineering from North Carolina State and an MBA from James Madison University. He founded Chadwick & Son Orchids Inc in 1989 with his father who had been growing orchids since 1943.

'The Classic Cattleyas' is widely considered to be the definitive book on large-flowered Cattleya species and was written by Art and his father. Martha Stewart favorably reviewed the now sold out 1st edition and had both Chadwicks on her TV Show. In 2020, an updated 2nd edition was released.

Art has the distinction of naming Cattleya hybrids after the wives of the last five U.S. Presidents and personally presenting the flowers to most of the honored recipients. He has spoken at two World Orchid Conferences - France 2005, Ecuador 2017 and his popular orchid advice column appears each month in many newspapers around the country.

Chadwick operates 11 greenhouses in rural Powhatan County, a retail store in Richmond,

and boards over 13,000 orchids for local clients. The company was recently featured in Southern Living magazine, The New York Times, the Washington Post, CBS Sunday Morning, and O Magazine.

In particular, cool, damp or rainy weather can mean death to some plants. Keep an eye on them and get them inside when conditions are no longer favorable.

National Capital Orchid Society Members Picnic

Monthly Meetings Process and Procedures:

It has been quite some time since we were able to gather as a group in-person. As such, we wanted to outline the protocols for our meetings.



Monthly Culture Checklist

- As summer starts to transition to fall, make sure to keep up the fertilization program. Your plants will be packing on the last of their summer size and getting ready to start sending up inflorescences.
- ☐ Some plants may already be showing signs of flower development. Be sure to look closely at your fall blooming plants and monitor flower development. Keep the crowns dry to help prevent diseases from taking hold. Water sitting in the leaf axis or at the point of inflorescence initiation can lead to rot and losing inflorescence.
- If you are growing outside, monitor your plants for fungal and bacterial infections. Our frequent storms and high humidity are highly desirable conditions for these pathogens and with conditions being so ideal, infections can spread quickly.

Culture Column: Erwinia: Battling a killer pathogen

There is little as an orchid grower that is more disheartening than inspecting your collection only to discover that some noxious pathogen has taken up residence in you collection, killing your plants indiscriminately.

Erwinia, is a family of bacteria that infect plants leaving large portions of necrotic tissue in its wake. If not caught and treated quickly, it can spread from a small portion of infected leaf, into the crown of a plant. Once into the crown, the plant will likely be unable to recover.

Due to their quick life cycle and the ability to increase their numbers exponentially, bacterial infections can be daunting. In agriculture, a member of the Erwinia family is known as fire blight, given its name because growers would visit their fields and it looked like previously healthy trees were burned overnight. Luckily with some planning and observation, you can treat this pathogen and save your plants.

Identification:

The most critical step is identifying the issue. Erwinia manifests as a watery brown spot on the leaf of a plant. Depending on the type of plant (ones with broad flat leaves) you may also easily see a yellow ring around the brown spot. On plants with narrow leaves this yellow ring can be difficult to see. The brown spot is the dead tissue, and the yellow ring is the advance of the bacterial colony. These lesions will often exude a viscus substance if touched or prodded that has a foul odor (often described as fishy).

Treatment:

Once you have discovered Erwinia in your collection, the first thing to do is separate the plant. This pathogen can be easily spread by splashing water or moved from one plant to another by using an unsterilized tool. Once the plant is moved, with a clean blade, begin to remove the infected areas of the plant. After each cut, you will need to either discard the blade if using disposable blades (highly recommended) or sterilize your tool with heat (a small plumber's torch does the trick). Remove the infected areas until you reach healthy tissue. Once cleaned, apply a bactericide (if you don't currently have something in your orchid medicine cabinet buy some, you don't want to be at the mercy of shipping if an infection occurs Physan or Phyton27 are two common treatments available) to the plant and keep it sperate and under observation for one to two weeks. If you see the infection flare back up repeat the treatments. You will also want to keep a close eye on any plants immediately adjacent to the infected plant and monitor for symptom. Remember these bacteria can spread quickly and is easily moved from one to another so be vigilant.

The National Capital Judging Center has reopened!


American Orchid Society Judges will be meeting each month to evaluate, and award outstand flowers grown by our local enthusiasts.
